## **Heads Up!**


'Not all heroes wear capes.'

**Dear Parents and Carers** 

Today we welcomed our new MP, Layla Moran and Councillor Emily Smith to JMS, to meet their new constituents and talk to them about our town and surrounding villages and of course, education. These two women serve our communities; Layla described herself as 'the mouthpiece for the public'. Our students were interested to learn about campaigning and what it was



like in parliament. The students wanted to express how much they valued the arts in their education, a sentiment that seemed very much aligned with what Layla had to say. I was impressed by her engagement with our young people and her interest in their work and learning. She was also keen to better understand the financial pressures facing our local schools and how she might voice these concerns. I look forward to welcoming them both







Public service has been something very prevalent in our recent news yet again, I am sure you have been struck by the bravery and compassion of our fire fighters, police and medical professionals in recent weeks, as they have fought to save lives and make good the tragedies that have befallen parts of our country.

Our public services, (and I would include teachers in this group), seem to be the people that are expected to stick things back together when they break, and I suppose in part, this is why they choose these careers. To serve your community is a great privilege and requires selflessness and understanding, regardless of who stands in front of you. The officer who hugged the child in Manchester who had lost her mother, the officer dancing with children at the Ariana Grande concert, the fire fighter sat exhausted with a Grenfell pensioner; all had no thought to their own safety or to the colour, creed, belief or background of the people they helped.

I read this week about the medical team who were treating the injured after the Borough Market attack and that the first patient through the trauma doors was one of the terrorists. I wonder what would go through my mind if I was met with the face of someone who had caused so much harm and suffering. Fear? Disgust? Or the need to help and save life at all costs? When the fire fighters ran towards a building that everyone else was so desperately running away from, what instinct kicked in? When the police were called to London Bridge where innocent people lay dying and injured, what fuelled their courage?

All of these people that choose to serve others do so because of the power of connection, of being part of something greater, and a desire to cure hate with love and kindness. They are the lungs of our society, labouring at times under the strain of man's inhumanity to man, but constant, methodical, rhythmic in their desire to serve and protect. We cannot survive without them; thank you, if this is you.

This spirit is one that I believe every child should understand – that we are part of something greater and all have a contribution to make. This is partly why we follow the Duke of Edinburgh Award in Year 10, and from September, all sixth form students will follow the Gold Award, because it allows young people the chance to make a difference in their community.

Today we had live music in the courtyard and invited children and staff to eat lunch together outside as part of the 'Great Get Together' in memory of Jo Cox, an MP who was serving her public when she was murdered last year. I think her legacy is a mighty one; unity, understanding, connection. If you can this weekend, get together with people – new or old friends and neighbours, let them know we are stronger together than apart, that your door is open if needed - be the change you want to see in the world, be a hero.

## Focus on Summer in the 6th Form

#### **Exam Season**

This is a particularly stressful time of year as the reality of final exams happens and for the Year 13s the inevitability of leaving JMS – home of learning for the last 7 years – looms ever closer. Students in both Year 12 and 13 are allowed some study leave, they are expected in lessons until they have taken the exam in that subject but at other times they can stay at home to study.

In Year 13 we have 50 students, they have made their Firm and Insurance University choices, and at present our destination data looks like this:

33 are aiming to go on to higher education either at University or College;

5 are going to do an Art Foundation course;

2 have secured apprenticeships already:

5 are coming back to JMS to finish their A level courses; and

5 are taking a gap year to get some work experience before moving on.

We wish them all the best for the remaining exams and fingers crossed for August and results day – Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> August 2017.

Year 12 are back in school having finished their exams and have started A2 coursework. It is a busy term for them as they have to start writing Personal Statements for University applications in the autumn, they are allowed 2 days off school for University Open days. Applications and interviews for the Senior Student team will take place, there will be training for the Peer Mentors and we have organised a first aid course too. They also have the time to finish off their voluntary hours and make sure that this is all signed off. Throw on top of all that the Summer Ball and the organisation that goes into that – chasing the non-payers, seating plans, menus, photobooth organisation, decorations and last but not least – What am I going to wear!

#### Monday 26th June - Thursday 29th June, 8.30am - 3.10pm

Meet the teachers and take part in a taster lesson of your chosen subjects.

Students will be given a booklet with all the information for week. They need to use this information to plan their sessions and record information about their subjects. 


